#### MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD

Thank you to those parents who attended our Meet the Teacher sessions for Years 3, 4 and 5 this week. We will share the presentations on our website next week for those of you who were unable to make it. Monday is the session for KS1 and for Year 6 so we hope to see you there.

This newsletter contains information this week about reading and spelling which hopefully you will find helpful. The start of the new school year is always incredibly busy and we endeavour to share information with you so that you have a broader understanding as to what goes on in school. If you feel that something is

missing then please do contact us.

From Monday, should you wish to contact a class teacher, there will be a new email address for you to use. This is teacher@mapletreeprimaryschool.com; this address can be used if you wish to contact the teacher about a class-based question - for attendance and absence you still need to report this through the office@mapletreeprimaryschool.com email address. The inbox will be monitored by SLT who will forward the email to the correct teacher. The teacher will then respond to you within 24/48 hours either with an email response or a phone call. This hopefully will allow your emails to get through to the correct member of staff in a timely manner whilst reducing the number of emails coming in through the school office. I would suggest though, that should your concern be urgent, that you ring into the office to ask for an appointment with the relevant staff member.

We are also in the process of updating our website with key information which you will be signposted to which hopefully you will find useful.

### **Spellings at Maple Tree**

Two years ago we signed up to a spelling programme called Spelling Shed for years 1-6. We are now moving away from using this company to structure our teaching and assessment of spellings and I wanted to share our reasons why.



- 1. **To ensure clear progression from phonics into spellings.** As part of the governments drive to ensure that phonics is being taught consistently across the nation, schools have had to choose a dedicated programme to follow. The programme that we have chosen is Twinkl Phonics and therefore we are moving to using Twinkl spellings so that the progression from one to the other is smooth.
- 2. **It wasn't working for most pupils.** As with any learning resource, school has been monitoring the impact that Spelling Shed had on the pupils' progress and attainment and although it worked well for some, it didn't promote engagement for all and wasn't having a positive impact on results.
- 3. **Research shows handwritten practise is more effective.** Although some pupils enjoyed playing the online spelling games, research has shown that the 'look, cover, write, check' method of handwriting spellings is a faster and more efficient way for most to learn new spelling patterns as you learn the 'pattern' of the word as you write it down.

Spellings will be given out by the class teacher in your child's spelling book, where they will be expected to practise at home. Records of spelling tests will be kept in the child's English book, as evidence for teachers when assessing. We encourage the pupils to learn spellings in context, and therefore may be asked to learn a whole sentence. If you have any questions please speak to your child's teacher.

## A focus on Reading: Accelerated Reader (AR)



#### What is Accelerated Reader?

<u>Accelerated Reader</u> is a computer program that helps teachers manage and monitor children's independent reading practice. Your child picks a book at their own level and reads it at their own pace. When finished, your child takes a short quiz on the computer. (Passing the quiz is an indication that your child understood what was read.) Accelerated Reader gives children and teachers feedback based on the quiz results, which the teacher then uses to help your child set goals and direct ongoing reading practice.



Children using Accelerated Reader choose their own books to read, rather than having one assigned to them. The books are not on a specific scheme but are the ones you can buy anywhere. This makes reading a much more enjoyable experience as they can choose books that are interesting to them. Staff help your child choose books at an appropriate readability level that are challenging without being frustrating, ensuring that your child can pass the quiz and experience success.

#### How does the school determine my child's reading level (ZPD)?

Teachers determine your child's reading level using a star Reading® test and their best professional judgment based on their knowledge of your child. A Star Reading test is a computerized reading assessment that uses computer-adaptive technology. Questions continually adjust to your child's responses. If the child's response is correct, the difficulty level is increased. If the child misses a question, the difficulty level is reduced.

#### What are points?

Every book that has an Accelerated Reader Reading Practice Quiz is given a point value. Points are computed based on the difficulty of the book and the length of the book (number of words). Pupils earn points by scoring well on the quiz.

#### How are Accelerated Reader point goals set?

Based on extensive research, we can provide guidelines for the approximate number of Accelerated Reader points children should be able to earn depending on how much time they read and their reading level. Monitoring Accelerated Reader points earned by children and comparing them to the guideline values enables your child's teacher to determine how well your child is using the time provided for reading practice.

#### How will I know if a book has an Accelerated Reader quiz?

To know which quizzes your school has available, contact your child's teacher as schools may not have purchased all quizzes. You can also visit the Accelerated Reader Bookfinder™ at arbookfind.com to conduct a search of all available books with Accelerated Reader quizzes.

#### How will I know how my child does on a quiz?

To know how your child is doing on their AR quizzes, parents will need to log in to Renaissance Home Connect. Using a login specifically for your child, parents will be able to access their quiz results. In addition, parents can specify up to six email addresses to receive automatic updates on their child's reading progress. Letters with your individual logins will be coming home next week from class teachers (in paper form).

#### How will my child take a quiz?

Students take Accelerated Reader quizzes on a computer or tablet with an internet connection. They can only take these in school.

#### How can I help my child become a better reader?

As with anything, performance improves with practice. Encourage your child to read at home. Create a culture of reading in your household by reading with your child, starting a home library, visiting your local library or bookstore on a regular basis, letting your child see you reading, and discussing books that each of you has read. When reading with your child, stop and ask questions to be sure your child is comprehending what is read. Reading with your child, no matter what the child's age, is an important part of developing a good reader, building a lifelong love of reading and learning, and creating a loving relationship between you and your child. Make learning a family affair!

# Supervision travelling to and from school

Over the last few weeks we have had a number of requests for pupils to walk to and from school alone, so we would like to share our policy on this with you.

#### Who is allowed to walk to and from school without supervision?

Years 5-6, with Year 4 joining them in the summer term in preparation for Year 5.

#### Who is allowed to pick up and drop off?

Preferably adults, but in some cases responsible young adults of secondary school age.

#### **Considerations:**

In some circumstances, exceptions can be made by asking at the school office. School will take into consideration the:

- NSPCC guidance of no child under 8 walking alone,
- behaviour and responsibility of the child,
- distance to walk home and who will be at home on their arrival.

#### Parent Forum Thursday 6th October 9am

We hold Parent Forum meetings every half term where we meet with class representatives to discuss things that are going on in school on a day to day basis. Sometimes the agenda items are led by parents and sometimes by the school.

For our first meeting this year, we would like to hold an open meeting where all are welcome and the discussion will be focused around mental health and wellbeing. This is such a key priority for us all we want share with you ways in which we support the children in school as well as hear your thoughts.

The meeting will be held in the school hall and will last no longer than an hour but would be a great opportunity to have a discussion with a larger group of you surrounding such important issues.

Following this meeting, we will confirm the names of the class reps and let you know where we have vacancies that can be filled.
