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Maths at Maple Tree

Over the last few months, we have had a focus on problem solving during our maths lessons. Every lesson will have an element of problem solving in some form or another. This is when children apply their fluency understanding and reason about the problem. We also continue to ensure that all children are challenged in their maths learning—not just some given a further question at the end! Children should feel challenge in their maths learning every day.

Early Years and **Key Stage 1** have begun a new journey in their maths mastery journey. This term, they are developing their knowledge of subitising as we start 'Mastering Number'. The basic premise of mastering number is that children can subitise and understand numbers. They can explain the 'oneness' of one etc.

As part of mastering number, children are enjoying our new resource, the Rekenrek. The Rekenrek is a counting frame, not to be confused with an abacus.



Autumn Term

During the autumn term, all children begin the year learning about place value. Our maths curriculum is a progressive curriculum, so each year builds on the

previous year. This means by the time children are in year 6, they will be learning about the place value of decimals.

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Multiplication at Maple Tree

All children will learn their times tables, although not formally until year 2, where they count in 2s, 3s, 5s and 10s. Being able to count and notice patterns begins as early as early years. Moving into year 3, children will learn all times tables and when in year 4, the children take a multiplication tables check.

The quick recall of tables facts is really important in maths. Being able to recall facts helps children in all areas—calculations, fractions, decimals, percentages, area and perimeter and measurement, for example.

We subscribe to TT Rockstars to support children with fluency practise from year 3 and Numbots from early years which supports number bonds.

Maths Mastery

Through our mastery approach of teaching and learning of maths, everyday has an element of concrete, pictorial, abstract **(CPA).** This is where children use manipulatives or pictures to underpin the foundations of maths. When they understand the fundamentals, they can then move onto the abstract—for instance a number sentence.

Maths Vocabulary

As with our progressive curriculum, maths vocabulary is also progressive.

We teach children to use the correct vocabulary from early years and encourage children to use this within full sentences in order to describe and reason about their mathematical thinking.

Being able to use correct vocabulary, for instance **dividend**, **divisor**, **quotient**, supports children's understanding of calculation and other areas of maths.

Children at Maple Tree are confident to use new vocabulary and can explain their learning to others using correct terms. During our recent Ofsted, a child was able to tell the inspector that they were **subitising** and then go on to explain what this meant.
