MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD

This week has been full of opportunities that fall under the 'wider curriculum', lessons that are important to the children in terms of developing their values and behaviour choices that will enable them to judge situations they may find themselves in years to come. Our

Then this week we have celebrated Anti-Bullying week. There is plenty of information over the page so you can see in more detail what each class has done.

It was also good to see a number of you at the Online Safety meeting last night which was led by the Cyber Protect and Prevent officer from Bedfordshire Police. It was extremely informative and really gave perspective to the scale with which children and young people interact with technology.

And finally, today has been a very busy day! It has been great to see the children supporting Children in Need by wearing non-uniform - another way of showing our key values; we will share the total raised with you next week though there is still time to donate <u>here</u> - and it was lovely to see so many of you attend our Open Afternoon this afternoon. I hope the children could talk confidently with you about their learning this week and are able to share the important messages that they have learnt.

Health and Safety

This week we are asking you to support us by ensuring your child does not scoot or cycle on the school grounds. ANTI-BULLYING WEEK 2023



Anti-Bullying Week 2023

The week kicked off on Monday with everyone wearing odd socks in order to

celebrate our uniqueness - to have fun, to be ourselves and to spread awareness of the key messages of Anti-Bullying week. There were some very colourful feet to be seen but a great way to get the messages across!

In **Reception** we have talked about different scenarios by looking at pictures and deciding if what we could see was friendly, or not friendly behaviour. We then discussed what friendly behaviour might look like. We also designed our own odd socks on Monday using a variety of different media such as crayons and paints.





In Yew class the children took part in odd sock day, and have been writing kind compliments and questions to their friends, such as 'would you like to sit next to me at lunch?' and ' you are really good at football'. They have also 'made a noise' about who they can speak to if they see or hear bullying.

Across the week **Aspen** have been looking at scenarios and have role played a variety of situations of how to get support if someone is being unkind. They did a superb job of acting and did a fabulous job of being the adult that can





help too. They went on to write down things that they could say to "make a noise about bullying". Their posters are great and they have selected some wonderful phrases.

Rowan have been 'making a noise' by creating posters and their own antibullying superhero which had them thinking of reasons why their powers would stop bullying. They have also made rhythms with percussion instruments for the words – power, intent, repetition, hurt and speak up. Along with this, they have thought about answering these questions:

 How can you speak up and make a stand about bullying?

- What would you say to someone engaging in bullying behaviour if you saw them in action?
- 3. What would your message against bullying be?
- Who can help spread the message and how can we do it?







The pupils in **Poplar** class have had a fantastic anti bullying week. They have learned a lot through their reading comprehension. They also took part in the live lesson on the internet. (Please don't ask them about Mrs Gregory's air guitar playing!)

Their own designs of the odd socks are going to look superb on display, alongside the absolutely, amazing anti-bullying, acrostic poems.

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The children wrote these independently, and the quality of their work was outstanding. Thank you, Poplar class for being brilliant this week at "Making A Noise About Bullying."

Juniper class has been learning about what is 'banter' and what is bullying. The children had to think about how they could tell someone that 'it is not a joke' anymore. We also got some inspiration from a Year 5 class who rapped about bullying, the children had to compose and write a two line rap and then

performed to everyone.

Elder class have been learning about the difference between banter and bullying.

We have defined banter and understand how this can easily become bullying. We all agreed that banter is fun if all those concerned find it fun. We made a 'Bantometer' to measure our feelings if a friend goes too far!

In **Sycamore**, we began our focus of Anti-Bullying week by discussing the importance of anti-bullying week and why there is a need for us to do it every year. We then moved onto our main focus for the week which was *understanding and contrasting bullying with banter*. We deliberated as individuals, as pairs and then as a class before creating definitions for **banter** and for **bullying**. The pupils then had to read through four different scenarios and decide whether these situations were examples of friends playfully exchanging banter or if the examples were of bullying. The children were required to explain using their definitions for support. The final task was to create their own role play scenarios (two), to show both banter and also, where what is labelled as banter has crossed over into bullying.

The pupils of Sycamore have shown sensitivity and compassion and I was a proud teacher listening to their discussions and answers.
