Our Approach to Trips and Visits

In our experience at Maple Tree Primary School, the benefits that school trips bring to your child's unique learning journey make them an essential part of any all-round education. There are many reasons why we believe this to be true. Firstly, trips build confidence and independence. At the end of Year 6 children have enjoyed their residential where they can enjoy outdoor and adventurous activities.



During trips, children experience learning outside of the classroom. Topics are brought to life in a new and exciting way. Trips support and enhance the curriculum, whilst providing new perspectives and wider context for your child to think about.

At Maple Tree we aim to run at least one trip a term – this can be off-site or a local trip. Expert visitors to school also add to your child's engagement of a topic.

All children engage in trips and visits – from Mulberries to Year 6. Before children take part in a trip, teaching staff have a lot to plan. This includes preliminary visits, risk assessments and all other admin needed to make the trip safe and enjoyable for all.

When planning trips, teaching staff must adhere to some strict rules – these include ratios. The younger the children the greater the adult to child ratio is. We always try to use school staff first, then governors and at times other volunteers who have a DBS. If governors and volunteers have children in school, they will always be placed in a group away from their own children. This ensures the safety of all children within a group.

We understand that, for some, a trip is a scary time. All of our staff are experienced in running trips and will do everything they can to ensure your child has an enjoyable day. After a trip, staff upload lots of photographs to your child's class page on our website. Here you will see what an amazing time they have had! Children may also be asked to write a short review of the trip or have some follow up work to complete in class.

Israel-Hamas Conflict

Whether directly or indirectly impacted by the tragedies that are being witnessed in the Israeli-Hamas conflict, children are disproportionately affected by violence. The high-profile coverage of the conflict naturally leads to an awareness of the topic, even for young children, but navigating discussions with children around war can be difficult because content and information shared with younger children should be age-appropriate. In school, we will sensitively speak with any child who raises concerns about this, but will not be having whole class discussions.

How can you support your child?

- Be aware of what your child is hearing, watching or reading. From headlines read on the radio, overhearing adult conversations or independently seeing posts on social media—most children will have access to some level of information on the topic.
- Be open to talk. If your child wants to talk about conflict, remain calm and non-judgemental. Speak to your child about their worries or concerns. Don't go into too much detail.
- Use trusted sources. Newsround is an excellent source for child friendly news; watch videos or read articles with your child. Visit: <u>childline</u>, <u>unicef</u> and <u>Newsround</u> for more parent guidance.
