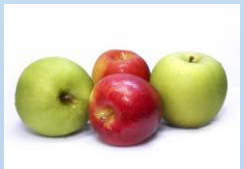

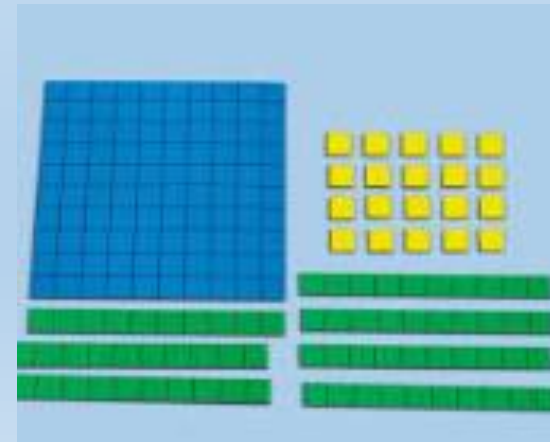
Break Times and Snack

- Named water bottles. **Water Only**



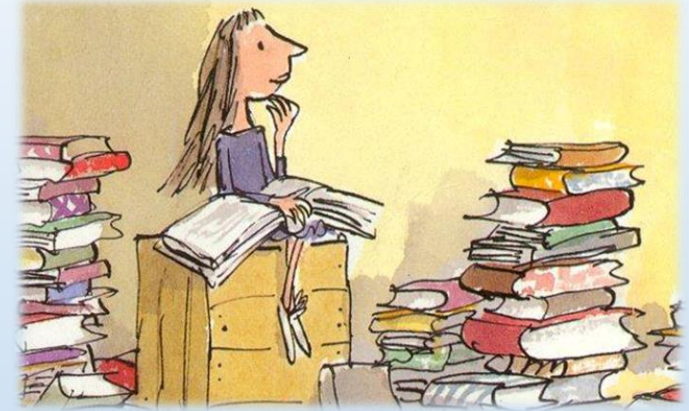
Maths

- How you can help at home -
 - **Number and place value** – counting, forming, recognising and representing, addition, subtraction, multiplication, division and fractions
 - **Shape** – 2D and 3D – including properties
 - **Money** – recognising different denominations – working out money problems
 - **Time** – o'clock, half past, quarter past, analogue, days of the week and months of the year
 - **Measurement** – capacity, length and weight
 - **Position and movement** – directions, turns

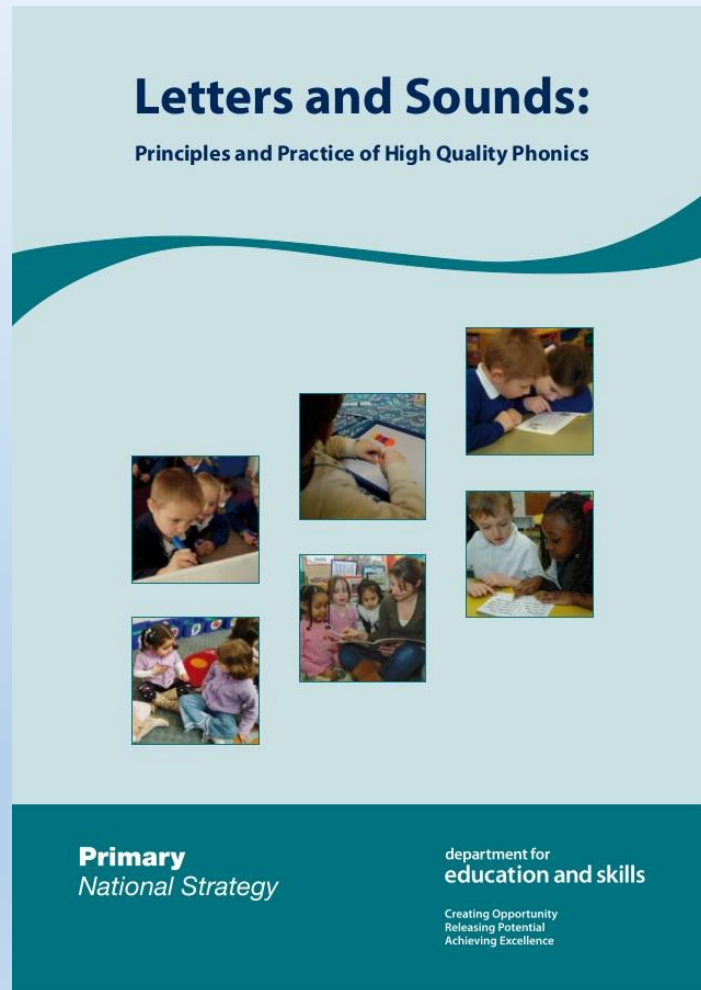


Reading Books and Accelerated Reader

- Year 1 diaries are checked and books swapped once the book has been read three times with an adult.
- Year 2 also swap books after being read three times. This will change if they move to the AR system.
- Encourage your child to read at home daily – make it fun!
- Comprehension – ask your child questions!
- Accelerated Reader – During Year 2 children can progress to the accelerated reading programme when ready



Phonics

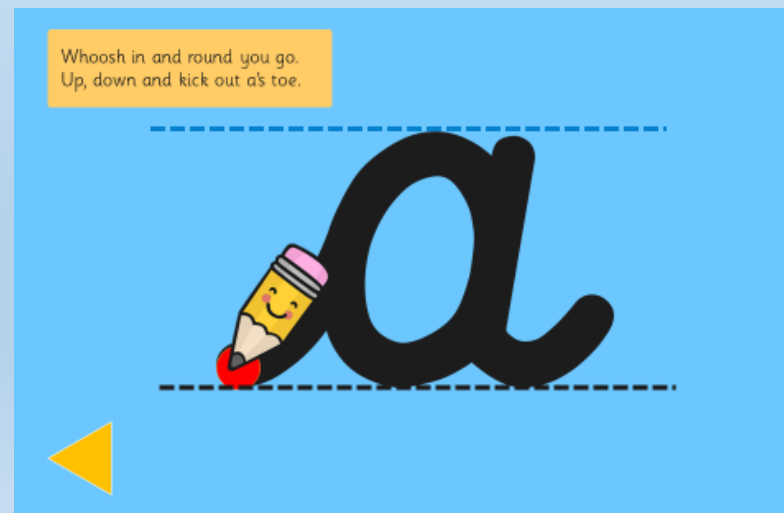
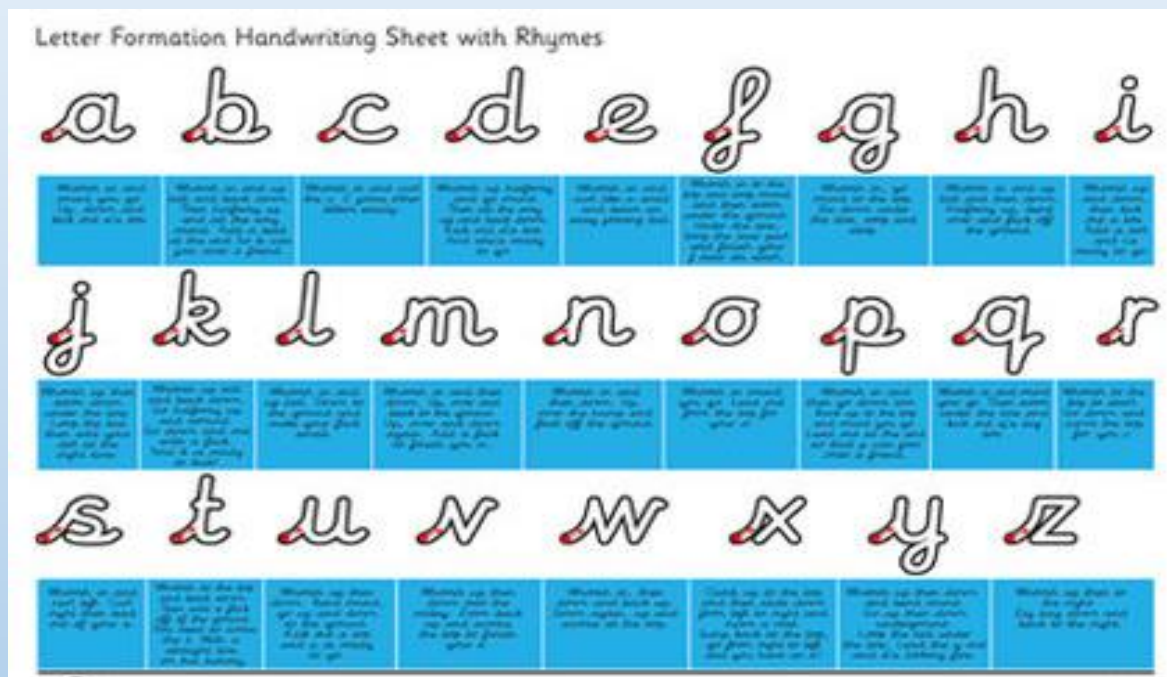


- Letters and Sounds Government recommendation
- Focus on phase 3, 4 and 5
- Phonics screening check year 1 and year 2



Handwriting

- Cursive – children are taught to write with pre-cursive handwriting ready to join their letters together
- Lead ins and lead outs
- Encourage to do this outside of school
- Form letters **and** numbers correctly
- Handout available for letter formation if needed

For new parents and those still to join, please ask the office for a letter. For existing parents, please remember to check you have the latest Class DoJo parent app installed and are logged in. You don't want to miss out!

What to expect? Teachers will be:

- Sharing a learning comment (activity) with all parents at least two times a week, such as a summary of what they have been learning about. This is a one way communication tool so the chat function is not in place. Please contact the teacher email should you need to ask anything.

Teachers may:

- Send out message reminders for things like PE kits or letters coming home.
- Send out points for children in different classes.

Uniform at Maple Tree Primary School

- All the children are expected to wear navy trousers, shorts or skirts with a royal blue knitted jumper or cardigan.
- In Mulberries only, we also accept navy joggers or leggings.
- From Reception to Year 2 the children wear white polo shirts under their jumpers.
- Across the school, yellow or blue checked summer dresses are allowed in the warm weather.
- All children should be wearing smart black school shoes; no heels, trainers or strappy sandals allowed. Velcro fastenings are much appreciated in the younger years where pupils can't yet tie their own laces.
- Our PE kit consists of: a yellow t-shirt, navy shorts, plain navy/black jumper and joggers and trainers for outdoor activities. Children should come to school in their PE kit on the day that they have PE or a PE club, as this maximises the learning time and decreases the amount of lost uniform. Earrings ideally should not be worn, however tape can be applied to cover them for the lesson. No hoops.

Housekeeping - How you can help?

- All belongings to be named including bottles
- Reading books in school everyday
- PE – outdoors – wear weather appropriate clothing, tape for pierced ears and hair tied back
- At times the children may become wet with outdoor activities and so a change of socks, bottoms, and underwear are useful



Pupil Premium



- **What is it?**

Pupil premium is an amount of funding that is given to the school to best support and improve attainment for low income families

- **Is it the same as Universal Free School Meals?**

No, Universal Free School meals is a government initiative in which children in EYFS and KS1 can receive free provided meals. From year 3 lunches are paid for by parents and guardians.

- **How does this help?**

PP funding can help with uniforms, school trips, lunches, resources in the classroom to aid learning

- **What do I need to know?**

The qualifying benefits to receive Pupil Premium Funding for all children (and free school meals in years Three and Four) are:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part IV of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The Guarantee element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit, and your annual gross income does not exceed £16,190 as assessed by His Majesty's Revenue and Customs)
- Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit)
- Universal Credit (during the initial roll-out of this benefit)
